

Executive Summary Criterion- wise Criterion I- Curricular Aspects:

The institution has been offering UG and PG courses. While offering UG (B.A., B.Com & B.Sc) and PG (M.Com & M.A. Marathi), the institution has been carrying scores of responsibilities since its inceptions (1990). During the course of the curricular, co-curricular aspects and extra-curricular aspects the institution has to deal with the development and implementation of the curriculum.

The institution doesn't have any right of offering the academic flexibility because the affiliating university S.R.T.M. University, Nanded has prescribed the academic flexibility framework to which the college has to abide. Even the curriculum has been set and prescribed by the affiliating university, the college at the best to enrich with the help of stakeholders-management, faculty members, students, parents through the maintenance of the feedback system. The college has been trying to maintain the quality education.

Criterion II- Teaching-Learning & Evaluation:

Teaching-learning and evaluation is the prime object of accomplishing the **quality education**, initiatives and enhancement or sustenance. The institution has served the students of different background and abilities through effective teaching-learning experiences from the administrative process to the examinations.

During the course of teaching-learning and evaluation, the institution maintains the student profile covering the demographic diversities and features. While summative assessment approach is conducted universally by the parent university .Internal assessment evaluative reforms positively affects the students daily attendance as well as teaching-learning process becomes interactive, participative & independent.

Every year seven-day residential camp is organized at the village adopted by the college.

- Participating in various state level and university level special camp.

 Participating in various social campaigns as Aids Awareness, Pulse Polio Programs, Surveying participation, Blood donation camp, Health camp, Animal husbandry camp, organ donation awareness programme, Road safety Awareness programme, Voting awareness programme, gender equity programme, anti-superstitious programme, cyber crime orientation programmes etc.

Cultural Activities:

Different cultural activities are conducted by the college through the department of the culture. Scores of the students used to participate in various cultural activities at the university, college levels. In each year college students participate in the university conducted youth festival as well as students participate in college gathering.

Public Speaking:

The college has the committee, which motivates the student by conducting guest lectures. Students are encouraged to participate in debating and elocution competitions conducted by the college, the parent university and other agencies.

Role of the Faculty:

The prime role of the faculty members is to bridge sound relation between teaching and learning exercise. As per the parent university prescribed syllabus, the faculty prepares its teaching and extra teaching planning. According to the planning the faculty members would complete their syllabus as well as they used to interact with the students regarding the teaching, learning and evaluation process.

After interacting with the stakeholders the principal consults with the top management which is very conscious about the college updating and upgrading in the infrastructural and IT infrastructure field.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The college principal is considered as the head of the institute who is fully equipped with the academic and administrative autonomy. As a result he plays an important role in facilitating the staff and the students in all respects.

The faculty members carry their curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities under the guidance and direction of the departmental heads. The top management has maintained its participative leadership as the institute nominates the teaching and

non-teaching representative on Local management council. At the same time the faculty members lead various committees in order to accomplish the leader's vision and mission.

The Management has appealed in The High Court, Aurangabad to challenge the Tribunal Judgment. The case is pending.


